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The purpose of this talk is to allay those fears, and encourage you to go far and often. I will describe steps of 'collecting in the bush', ranging from early preparation in the library, cover the logistics of actually "doing" to how you bring the material back. This will be illustrated by personal experiences from collecting on five continents with an emphasis on Africa. Relative to its immense mineralogical treasures, Africa is probably the most ignored continent. Most of us are familiar with superb minerals from about a handful of localities, but in spite of their immense glory, they are barely the proverbial tip of the iceberg.
