Mineralogical Record Index Project

I am pleased to report that volunteers have completed all of the proof-reading required to transmit the computerized index to the printer for typesetting. Financing is in place and the first batch of galley proofs are in circulation for one final check. It is truly exciting to see the end product taking form after such a monumental effort by many dedicated individuals and inspiring leadership by Mike Groben.

I can not overstate the usefulness of the fourteen-year index of the Mineralogical Record. It will contain all of the information seen in each annual index (December issue) plus many additional categories and subjects. For instance, the fourteen-year index will contain the following subheadings under the general category: appraisals, auctions, book reviews, claim staking, collecting (field), collections, collectors, color, crystal growth, donors, epitaxic growths, errata, fakes, fluorescence, Glossary of Minerals, history (localities), history (memorabilia), history (minerals), inclusions, indexes, labels, locality preservation, meteorites, mineral testing apparatus, museums, organic compounds and minerals, pegmatites, photography, preservation and care of minerals, pseudomorphs, stamps, surveys, tektites, theft, toxic minerals, twinning, photographs (localities), photographs (maps), photographs (minerals), and photographs (personalities). There is much much more. Under localities there are 4,000 listings for mines and quarries. There are 11,000 mineral entries listed by locality, page and volume. The index will have 225 pages with a format similar to the Tsumeb issue of the Mineralogical Record.

The index will be available in time for the Tucson show, February of 1985. Look for it then. Every collector should have a copy to use as a research tool or as an invaluable reference book. The sole distributor for the index will be the Book Department of the Mineralogical Record, P. O. Box 1656, Carson City, Nevada 89702, telephone 702-883-2598.

The index will cost \$19.50 post-paid. Only 2900 copies will be available, so better get yours before they are sold.

NEWS FROM REGIONS

Colorado Chapter

The Colorado Chapter 1984 Symposium was held in conjunction with the Denver Council Gem and Mineral Show on September 9th. Of the various talks presented, the one on Colorado Tarryall Mountain topaz drew the most interest. The symposium chairman, Mark Jacobson, was generally pleased with the results although an effort needs to be made to increase attendance at future symposiums. During the November meeting Art Bookstrom presented a program on Porphyry Molybdenum Deposits of Colorado. At the January meeting John Shannon will speak on "Minerals of Gilpin County, Colorado."

Pacific Northwest Chapter

The tenth annual symposium was held in Tacoma, Washington September 28th through the 30th. It was the best ever with interesting talks, well-stocked mineral dealers and a spirited mineral auction. A total of 129 people paid registration fees to attend the functions. The keynote speaker was John Sinkankas. He reminisced about a lifetime of collecting minerals from such noted localities as the Lower New Street Quarry in Paterson, New Jersey to Ivigtut, Greenland. He spoke of flying airplanes and writing articles for Rocks and Minerals, the Lapidary Journal, as well as authoritative books on gemstones. He talked about his latest passion--gem and mineral books from the 1700's and 1800's. His lecture was a pleasure for all to hear. There was a stirring rendition of "On Top of the Mountain" by Bob and Russ Boggs. Pete Modreski described Table Mountain and other Colorado zeolite localities. There were over 25 mineral cases for public viewing stocked with outstanding mineral specimens. The symposium chairman was Chris Check.

New Mexico Symposium

About 150 people attended a very well organized "5th Annual New Mexico Mineral Symposium" November 10 and 11 in Socorro, New Mexico. The meeting was hosted by Bob North of the New Mexico Bureau of Mines and Mineral Resources. Although this symposium is not an FM-sponsored activity, it fits in closely with our interests and goals, and many FM members from New Mexico, Colorado, Arizona, and other states were represented among the audience and the speakers. The program included 15 talks, most about New Mexico mineral localities but also covering some in Arizona, Colorado, Utah, and Texas. There was a booklet for participants of abstracts of the papers; handouts describing several local mineral collecting areas; an evening cocktail hour and banquet, featuring the president of the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology as a speaker, and an impromptu auction of several mineral specimens and books; and a silent auction of minerals on Sunday afternoon. The symposium is also developing into informal motel-room sessions of viewing, discussing, trading, and selling microminerals and other mineral specimens on Friday and Saturday evenings. The meeting was lively and stimulating, and well worth a trip from out-of-state to participate. A 6th meeting is planned for the same time, next year, and Betty Tlush is eager to enlist enough FM members in New Mexico to form an FM chapter.

Mineralogical Society of Victoria, Australia

The President of FM, Mike Groben, has been corresponding with his counterpart in Port Melbourne, Victoria. An arrangement is being worked out whereby the Mineralogical Society of Victoria would become affiliated with the Friends of Mineralogy making FM a truly international organization. Through the exchange of newsletters and membership

lists, we will all benefit by enhancing our knowledge and developing new ties with our peers abroad. There will be more on this subject at our annual meeting in February.

This year we will not send out a membership list to conserve funds for publishing the index. Those of you who wish to have a list of FM members should contact Ron Bentley, 309 Irvin Drive, Midland, Texas 79705. He may be able to provide a computer generated list-for a fee. The next membership directory will be sent out during 1985.

Inventory of Interests of FM Members

At the beginning of this year, we asked all (new and continuing) FM members to fill out a sheet giving the usual address information, plus a questionnaire about your interests in different mineral and FM-related activities. We would like to collect and summarize this information and include it in the next FM membership directory. This will serve our organization's goal of putting people in touch with others of similar interests, and will be a great help to us when we look for volunteers to assist with particular projects. Pete Modreski has offered to organize this information; at present, he has on hand questionnaires from about 58 (out of about 600) FM members. We can all help with this urgent effort by:

(1) Each FM chapter secretary/treasurer/or membership chairperson should be sure that all completed questionnaires are forwarded to Pete; and that each new member fills out an FM application/questionnaire.

(2) Every FM member should have filled out a questionnaire, and returned it either to their chapter secretary or to the FM treasurer. If you have not yet done so, please fill one out and send it in. Extra copies of the form should be available

from each chapter secretary, or may be requested from any national FM officer.

Topaz Mountain, Utah

Two letters have been received pertaining to the Topaz Mountain controversy. Lawrence Dee, a geologist with the Bureau of Land Management in Shoshone, Idaho writes on November 16th that he checked on the claim status and found that "the Utah State Bureau of Land Management mistakenly invalidated the mining claims on the mountain and upon further reconsideration they are now back to current status." He further states that validity examinations will be conducted on all of the claims and if they are found invalid, the area will be withdrawn from mineral entry and returned to use by the general public. The problem is further complicated in that there is state land in the area which will be exchanged with the Bureau of Land Management. Find on page 6 of this newsletter a letter from Governor Scott M. Matheson explaining the State's position.

Bob Randolph, District Supervisor of Bureau of Land Management for the Topaz Mountain area has been quoted as saying that there are areas available to the public for recreational mineral collecting--namely the "North Wall" and the "East Wall."

Thank you for expressing your interest in keeping the Topaz Mountain area in Utah open for recreation and rock collection. I agree with your premise and I support the Bureau of Land Management's effort to keep Topaz Mountain open to the public.

Part of Topaz Mountain is state land: the state has two gem stone leases of 40 acres there. The state of Utah, however, is in the process of exchanging its trust lands in this area with other lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management. An application for this land exchange has been submitted by the Bureau of Land Management. I support and encourage this action. Such a land exchange would eliminate the state land trust conflicts currently existing in this area. The exchange of lands would consolidate all lands in question under the management purview of the Bureau of Land Management, thus terminating state management prerogatives. I feel confident that the Bureau of Land Management will administer these lands in a manner that will adequately accommodate the interests of recreationists and rock collectors.

Thank you again for corresponding with me on this issue.


